Collided with a berg off the entrance to St. Mary's Bay, Newfoundland [another report says on the Grand Banks]. Perhaps accident occurred on Grand Banks and survivors picked up off St. Mary's Bay.

Damage Description:

Almost immediately sank and all 78 fishermen took to boats. One one boat apparently survived. Her complement was 7 men and 3 of them perished from exposure and hunger. Two of these were thrown overboard but the third was eaten. Survivors picked up by "Victor Eugene", April 26, (see 28 April 1897) seven days later and landed at St. Pierre April 27. Survivors were in shocking condition and so badly frostbitten their arms must be amoutated. Reports differ. "Victor Eugene" could be two separate vessels.
